

# Arkansas State Fair Swine Handbook



## Section 1: Market Hogs

Minimum weight for Market Hogs is 220 pounds. Maximum weight is 290 pounds.

Market Hog ownership deadline: June 26, 2021

Each exhibitor is limited to three market hogs in the show, no more than two crossbred market hogs. (If an exhibitor chooses to exhibit three market hogs, one must be a breed classifying hog. If that hog does not meet breed standards during classification, the exhibitor must choose which two crossbred hogs they would like to exhibit).

All hogs must participate in the validation system through the Arkansas Cooperative Extension Service. Either barrows or gilts may be shown.

Show classes will be divided by weight.

Exhibitors will declare show weights. A 5 % weigh-back policy is in place for the market hog show and any hog is subject to being weighed back.

Registered gilts in the market show may also enter the breed show classes.

Crossbred gilts (two per exhibitor) in the market show may also enter the commercial gilt show.

Market Hogs will be shown in the following divisions:

- Berkshire
- Chester White
- Duroc
- Hampshire
- Spotted
- Yorkshire
- AOB
- Crossbred

\*If a breed currently in AOB has 10 or more hogs exhibited, that breed will pull out of AOB and have a breed show.

Any Division may be split in to classes/divisions as show management see fit by weight

### **Market Hog Breed Characteristics:**

#### **Berkshire:**

- A black and white animal with erect ears exhibiting Berkshire character.
- A Berkshire must have white on all four legs, face, and tail (unless tail is docked). One of the white leg points may also be missing.
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- A Berkshire must NOT have a solid white or a solid black face from the ears forward.
- A Berkshire must NOT have a solid black nose (rim of nose).
- White is allowed on the ears, but NO solid white may appear on the ears.
- Occasional splash of white may appear on the body.

**Chester White:**

- Must possess Chester White breed characteristics.
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Must be solid white in color, no color on the skin larger than a silver dollar, no colored hair.
- Any skin pigmentation other than white that exceeds five in number are disqualified.
- Ears must be down and medium size.
- Any signs of weighted ear tags or evidence of past existence of such ear tags are determined to be not permissible and are grounds for disqualification.

**Duroc:**

- Must be red in color and possess Duroc breed character. (Ears must be down and medium size)
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Must NOT have any white hair located on the animal.
- Must NOT have any black hair located on the animal.
- Must NOT have more than three black spots on the skin, and none of these spots can be larger than two inches in diameter.
- Must NOT have any shading or indication of a belt.

**Hampshire:**

- Must be black in color with a white belt starting on the front leg. The belt may partially or totally encircle the body.
- Must possess Hampshire breed character. (ears must be erect and not rounded)
- Can have white on the back legs, as long as it is from the hock down.
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Must NOT have any white hair or indications of streaking on the forehead.
- Must NOT have any red hair.

**Hereford:**

- Must be red, light, or dark red with at least 50% white face, at least 50% red body and at least two white feet.
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Ears must be at least broke forward.

**Landrace:**

- Must be white in color and possess Landrace breed character. (ears must be down)
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Must NOT allow any color other than white.
- Must NOT allow more than three spots of skin pigmentation.

**Poland China:**

- Must possess Poland China breed characteristics.
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Must be black with six white points (face, feet, and switch) with an occasional splash of white on the body. A hog may not possess more than one solid black leg and be determined as a Poland China. Tail docking is permissible.
- Ears must be down.

### **Poland China (continued)**

- Must NOT have evidence of a belt formation.
- Cannot have red or sandy hair and/or pigment.
- Hogs that have weighted ear tags or evidence of tampering of ears with possible ear tags are ineligible.
- Must NOT have any colored hair other than white.
- Must NOT have colored skin pigmentation larger than one U.S. minted silver dollar.
- Must NOT have marking above the eyes larger than a silver dollar.

### **Spotted:**

- Must be black and white in color.
- Must possess Spotted breed characteristics.
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Ears must be down and reasonably sized. Ears cannot be erect.
- Any red tinted or brown spots are ineligible.
- No solid black head from the ears forward.
- No white belt pattern (hair or skin) encircling and extending down and onto each shoulder.

### **Yorkshire:**

- Must be white in color and possess Yorkshire breed character. (ears must be erect)
- Must be ear notched within seven days of birth.
- Must NOT have any color hair except white.
- Must NOT have more than two pigmentation spots larger than a U.S. minted silver dollar.

The Market Hog Show will be divided in to a two day show:

- Breeds and Lightweight Crossbreds (235 pounds and under) will be shown during Market Hog Show A.
- Heavyweight Crossbreds (Over 235 pounds) will be shown during Market Hog Show B.
- There will be a classifier on site during check-in for ALL exhibitors who declared a breed.
- Market Hog Showmanship integrity rule applies. If exhibitor has opportunity to participate in both Market Hog Showmanships, the exhibitor must choose which to participate in.

## **Section 2: Commercial Gilts**

Commercial Gilts are defined as any crossbred or any purebred gilt that is ineligible for registration.

The minimum weight for a Commercial Gilt is 220 pounds. There is no maximum weight.

Exhibitors will declare show weight. There will be a random 5 % weigh back at the discretion of show management.

All hogs must participate in the validation system through the Arkansas Cooperative Extension Service. Gilts will be assigned to class by weight by show management.

Exhibitors are limited to two entries.

If the commercial gilt was also entered in the market show, a different weight for the gilt can be declared for entry in the commercial gilt show. Market hog shows weights will not be considered in any way, and will not be used for entry in to the commercial gilt show. Hogs that show in the market hog show are NOT automatically entered in the commercial gilt show. Separate entry in the commercial gilt division is required for each hog.

**Section 3: Registered Breeding Swine**

The following rules will be enforced for the Junior Breeding Swine Show:

- An exhibitor may enter no more than two animals in each class.
- All exhibitors are responsible for making sure their animals meet the breed color marking requirements for exhibition. All animals not meeting the breeds marking requirements for exhibition will be disqualified and will NOT receive a refund of entry fees.
- Registration papers are required and will be inspected during check-in for proof of ownership and age of animals entered.
- All animals shown must exhibit well-healed litter marks.
- Pigs farrowed after May 31 of current year are not eligible for competition.
- There will be no Boar Show Breeding Swine Show

**Breed Show Requirements:** All breeds recognized in the handbook for the current year fair will have a breed show at the state fair regardless of number of entries. Superintendent will review entry information each year and determine eligible breeds. Any breed that does not have a recognized show will compete in AOB. If a breed has more than ten entries at the fair, that breed will have a recognized show at that fair.

**Supreme Gilt** will be chosen following the breed shows.

### Bred & Owned Gilt Show:

Exhibitors may indicate during the registration process that their registered gilt is bred and owned and be eligible for bred and owned prizes during the Junior Breeding Swine Show.

- Classes will be the same as the Junior Breeding Swine classes.
- Exhibitor must have owned the dam at time of breeding.
- NJSA Bred & Owned rules will be followed pertaining to ownership and registration papers.
  - Siblings living at the same address can be listed on the same pedigree as the breeder and owner and qualify for the Bred & Owned show.
  - The owner number and breeder number must be identical to qualify.
- Bred & Owned entries must be signified during the registration process. No on-sight entries.
